

Evaluation of Risk

This information has been put together to help you plan a safe and enjoyable visit to Chiltern Open Air Museum. It can be used to help you fill in your risk assessment but we still advise you to visit the Museum **free of charge** before your school visit.

Please remember – do not be afraid to ask for help from any member of the Museum team at any time during your visit.

Inappropriate behaviour towards children & child abuse	Low	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ We always ask for two referees from new activity leaders. ○ All of our activity leaders have received Enhanced Disclosures from the Criminal Records Bureau and we will be registering all activity leaders and helpers with the Independent Safeguarding Authority from July 2010. ○ All of our activity leaders abide by a Code of Behaviour whilst working at the Museum. ○ We have a Child Protection Policy, which is updated every three years, and this can be downloaded from our website. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Your school policies will be implemented regarding this issue. ○ Please let the Education Officer know if you have any concerns relating to behaviour towards the children in your care during your visit as soon as possible.

When the Museum is open between April and October there is also someone to help you at the Museum Shop and the Museum Café. ○ We do have a search procedure which we put into action as soon as a child is reported missing. Poisoning from plants and berries	Low	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> o Please be aware that the Museum is a natural countryside site and as such is home to a variety of flora and fauna. o We strongly recommend that no plants or berries should be picked unless guidance and permission is given by a member of the Museum team. o There is always someone at the Museum Office and the High Wycombe Toll House who carries a two-way-radio during your visit, and many of the activity leaders carry them also.
